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





CUMBELAND VISTA is one of three Christian group homes for intellectually disabled adults operated by C.R.O.S.S. Inc. (Christian Residential Opportunities & Social Services). Cumberland Vista is located behind Cumberland Valley Brethren In Christ Church, at the top of the hill.

<u>Directions to Cumberland Vista from Rt. 15 and Lisburn Road</u>

Head west on Lisburn Road 1.3 miles.

At traffic light at Williams Grove Road make a LEFT (heading south) for 2.1 miles.

At the stop sign at 74 North (Carlisle Road/York Road) make a RIGHT. Go 0.5 miles.

Slow down as you approach the Cumberland Valley Brethren In Christ Church on your left.

Make a LEFT into the church parking lot and keep going straight up the driveway and up the hill.

The driveway will eventually turn to the right and then curve to the left up the hill.

Cumberland Vista is at the top of the hill.

Park either in the back lot (basement level) which you will come to first OR in the top parking lot (which is actually the front of the house but faces the back of the property).

We usually begin meeting in the basement. For special events (where we will be cooking/baking), we usually converge on the first floor which is the top entrance.

Healing Communities

On Friday, October 23rd I attended the Healing Communities Training developed by the Annie E. Casey Foundation and sponsored by the Pennsylvania Council of Churches. During this training I interacted directly with ministers and volunteers from several faiths including A.M.E., Baptist, Church of the Brethren, Episcopal, Methodist, Quaker, and Wicca. We focused our day on issues of mass incarceration in our society and how this impacts our entire community.

We focused much of our time on how to create a culture of support for victims, offenders, families, friends, and the community. Seven questions we reflected on are as follows:

- 1. Why are we so ashamed of those who commit crimes in our communities?
- 2. Am I ashamed of my own family member who is incarcerated? If so, what am I ashamed of?
- 3. Are we afraid of those in prison or who have been in prison? What are we afraid of and why?
- 4. How do we, as a community, move beyond shame and fear to assume the role we should be playing?
- 5. What can we do to be more welcoming to returning citizens and more embracing of their families?
- 6. Are you visiting your family member in prison? Are you visiting the people in your congregation in prison? Their family members?
- 7. How can we reconcile and restore those who have been in prison back into the heart of our community?

I'd welcome the opportunity to talk in more depth with anyone from Slate Hill who believes in balancing justice with mercy. How could we support both victims and offenders and their families at Slate Hill? Some of the clients have physical and psychological needs. Others have medical concerns, or suffer from dementia, social isolation, inactivity and the risk of falling. Care takers value being able to drop off a family member at Life Time. This enables care givers to



continue to work or get a needed break while allowing Life Time participants to remain in their own families and communities.

Ulli packs his guitar and a box of props and heads over to Life Time each month. The next visit will be Monday, Dec. 21,1:30-3:30PM. Hymns, folk songs, and funny songs are the staple of this afternoon of fun.

Rachel Hoover Sets Roots in Shirati

After 16 hours of plane rides and 10 hours in buses and cars, Messiah graduate and Slate Hill worshipper, Rachel Hoover, made it safely, with all luggage intact, to Shirati, Tanzania. Rachel will spend the next year utilizing her nursing major to assist were needed at the Shirati Hospital. This possibility came together with the help of Slate Hiller Dale Ressler, the Shirati Hospital and The Second Tunic. The Second Tunic is a Mennonite-rooted ministry which provides support to those who seek to serve others in the name of Christ. Ulli Klemm, also from Slate Hill, serves on a three-person care team for Rachel. Following are some notes from Rachel's recent communications with Ulli.

"It is hard for me to be in a constant state of receiving. Imani is the head of the nursing school and, with her husband, Fred, constitutes the host family I am currently staying with. She has provided food, shelter, bathing water, clean drinking water, and internet service. Serving others is where I feel I fit best and I really hope (and expect) this to happen at some point. And Swahili is most definitely the main language here! So I guess I have to kick up my language learning skills. Right now, I rely solely on non-verbal cues and sporadic English translations to be a part of daily life. I'm in the process of finding an English-Swahili dictionary so that I can learn more. I am giving myself grace in learning to like the food and learning the language. I am learning to laugh and be more patient and to embrace the slower pace of life.

"Because I do not know the Swahili language, I sometimes felt useless, powerless, and like I was a burden, and I was using so many resources. But I am feeling more productive, useful, and like I'm finally getting the hang of things. This week, I went to the hospital to orient myself in the maternity ward. We had five mothers deliver and three of them were complicated. I helped resuscitate several babies and have never been so humbled by the realization of just how powerless we humans are. I was privy to the joy of life, the sorrow of death, and the intimate experience of bringing new life into the world.

"I have had a bit of culture shock, but in the midst of it all, I've been learning that even though this culture is so different from the one I'm used to, it still works and functions within this context."

Things you probably wonder about:

- There are poisonous animals (snakes, black/green mambas).
- So far I've had an ant and a lizard make it inside my mosquito net. The ant merits a
 place on the list only because it was a biting ant.
- There is no running water to speak of. When it runs, we use it to fill the buckets in the bath room to rinse refuse down the toilet (no sink running water).
- I have a nice small room to myself with a door that closes, but sound disregards all barriers.
- The rainwater is collected in large tanks for our daily use. There is some hot water in the morning for showers bucket showers.
- Electricity has been good so far. It has been going off pretty regularly, especially before it rains. But it's not been a problem.
- There are wild dogs and cats around, but no pets. Well, chickens, but they will eventually get eaten.

"God has given me a peace about the future, a peace to know that He is always there. Praise God for his presence! "
