

# MISSION HAPPENINGS/NEEDS

# Mennonite Central Committee (MCC)

The MCC and its partners are providing assistance to displaced people in areas of eastern Ukraine by helping with rent or shelter needs and distributing hygiene kits, comforters and food. They want to expand this year by offering comforter making activities to school groups. This will not only help meet immediate local needs, but provide a skill that students can carry with them for a lifetime. Such skills may prove useful in later life to get a job or to provide for needs of their families.

The MCC is in urgent need at this time of sewing kits. Such kits open doors to additional income that can help a family make ends meet. Kits are often distributed through MCC - supported programs teaching sewing or tailoring skills and they contain tools to make and mend clothing or to begin a business.

Kits should consist of NEW:

- 3 spools of white thread and 3 spools of black thread (spools should contain a minimum of 250 yards, be all-purpose, and a blend of cotton/polyester or 100% polyester)
- 1 metric fabric tape measure
- 1 thimble, medium size
- 1 pair dressmaker's scissors high quality
- 1 package/25 or more needles
- 1 package 100 or more of straight pins
- 12 matching shirt-style black or white buttons, (loose buttons should be placed in a reseal able plastic bag)
- 1 package 20 25 sew-on snaps
- 10 assorted size safety pins

Individual supplies are welcome as well as complete kits. Please place items/kits in the designated box under the mailboxes.

# 10 THINGS WE CAN DO TO SUPPORT OUR MUSLIM NEIGHBORS

In light of recent events internationally, nationally and locally, there is much fear and distrust of Muslim people. Unfortunately, instead of reaching out to learn and build relationships, many people have chosen to make hateful, ignorant statements directed at Muslim people, which is fueling Islamophobia across the country. And although it may not make the news, Islamophobia is present in our own community. This rhetoric has real consequences, as the New York Times recently reported hate crimes against Muslim Americans in the U. S. have tripled.

There will always be those, regardless of religion or background, who are willing to use violence to further their agendas. We must be mindful of real threats and always take them seriously, but our response will be our community's most powerful recourse. Anti-Muslim sentiment is the kindling used to fuel further hateful behavior - and seemingly benign things, like stares or whispers, can easily escalate into harassment or threats.

As an organization dedicated to empowerment and the elimination of racism, the <u>YWCA Greater Harrisburg</u> stands in solidarity with our Muslim neighbors and friends. We believe that empowerment of marginalized individuals is a much more effective tool to defeat those who want to cause harm. By engaging with our Muslim neighbors we are effectively countering hate and intolerance - we create allies, - not enemies, - and inspire hope for a future of safety and acceptance of all people, all races and all religions.

We urge you to stand in solidarity with our local Muslim communities by taking these 10 practical steps:

- Smile and be friendly. Muslims experience daily stares, whispers, harsh words and distrust in public places, so a smile and a friendly word can go a long way to helping them feel safe and welcome.
- Be an ally. As a bystander, intervene if you see someone being mistreated. Stand up, speak
  up and offer support and afterwards be sure to report it to the <u>PA Human Relations Com</u>
  mission (PHRC).
- Educate your family, co-workers and friends. Don't let ignorant, hateful comments slide even on social media! Click Here to End Hate provides guidance on counteracting antiMuslim bigotry online.
- Talk with your children about the importance of standing up for Muslim classmates who are being bullied at school.
- Write a letter/card of support to local mosques. Have your children include "glad you're our neighbor" cards addressed to the Muslim children at the mosques.
- Write an op-ed or letter to the editor. We need many voices speaking out in solidarity with our Muslim neighbors and friends. PennLive's guidelines for submission are here.
- Visit a Masjid, a mosque, to learn about Muslim faith and practice and build relationships. Explore opportunities to fellowship together or work together on a community project.

- Show your support by hanging a banner or sign at your home, workplace, community center
  or place of worship. "I (Heart) My Muslim Neighbor" yard signs will soon be available through
  Showing Up for Racial Justice (SURJ) here, with all proceeds going to the Arab American
  Association of NY.
- Volunteer to go shopping with Muslim women. Women especially are being targeted in public places, so consider volunteering to accompany a Muslim woman to do her shopping.
- Host an educational forum. Getting accurate information to people is so important, so consider hosting an educational forum in your home, workplace, community center or place of wor ship.

The YWCA works closely with both the <u>Islamic Society of Greater Harrisburg</u> and the <u>Ahmadiyya Muslim Community</u> in Harrisburg. Several of you have asked recently about the progress of my studies, so here's a quick update.

In October I finished a course called Contemporary and Integrative Theories of Marriage and Family Counseling. (Read more about that in the October, 2015 Hilltop News.) The course ended with a massive project pulling together theory and technique from all of my classes so far. The project involved creating a large document that frames my counseling approach and keeps frequently used assessments and tools close at hand. I've already found myself referring to this document several times and know that it will be a helpful resource for years to come.

Following the conclusion of that class, I made the decision to take a break from school so that I could be more available to care for my mother-in-law during her medical treatments and more attuned to my family as we live as a three-generation household of six. During this time, I continue my work at Slate Hill, giving me many opportunities to use the learning that the Master's program has afforded me so far. I'm grateful to be able to reinforce this previous learning and utilize it to the benefit of our church and community. At the same time, of course, I'm gaining new perspectives about individual and family responses to challenging medical situations. No doubt these will enhance my future counseling work as well.

I'm not sure yet when I'll return to my graduate work, but when I do I'll have three classes left and then three semesters for practicum and internship. Thank you for your continued support of my education and especially for your support of our family during this journey.

**CUMBELAND VISTA** is one of three Christian group homes for intellectually disabled adults operated by C.R.O.S.S. Inc. (Christian Residential Opportunities & Social Services). Cumberland Vista is located behind The Meeting House (the former Cumberland Valley Brethren In Christ Church), at the top of the hill.

### Directions to Cumberland Vista from Rt. 15 and Lisburn Road

Head west on Lisburn Road 1.3 miles.

At traffic light at Williams Grove Road make a LEFT (heading south) for 2.1 miles.

At the stop sign at 74 North (Carlisle Road/York Road) make a RIGHT. Go 0.5 miles.

Slow down as you approach the **Cumberland Valley Brethren In Christ Church** on your left.

Make a LEFT into the church parking lot and keep going straight up the driveway and up the hill.

The driveway will eventually turn to the right and then curve to the left up the hill.

Cumberland Vista is at the top of the hill.

Park either in the back lot (basement level) which you will come to first OR in the top parking lot (which is actually the front of the house but faces the back of the property).

We usually begin meeting in the basement. For special events (where we will be cooking/baking), we usually converge on the first floor which is the top entrance.

# Community Connections Breakfast



Community Connections Breakfasts are held monthly on Saturday mornings at local churches to help connect prisoners in work release/re-entry programs to community resources and local churches. The breakfasts are part of the ministry of Christian Churches United (CCU) of the Tri-County Area. CCU's oldest ministry, the Prison Action Committee (PAC), serves as a voice for those incarcerated and coordinates both staff and volunteer pastoral care for inmates at area prisons. For nearly ten years PAC has coordinated these monthly breakfasts at local churches. Each month a different church provides

breakfast; an inspirational speaker will also share his/her journey through similar experiences and their how they are attempting to overcome the past through a faith journey.

Last July, the Slate Hill Men's Fellowship hosted a Saturday morning breakfast for men and women in the work release and prison transition programs. We will be hosting a breakfast again in 2016, but on February 20th instead of in July. The breakfast will begin at 9:00 although Slate Hill volunteers (men and women) need to arrive by 8:00 to help prepare for our guests.

### Some stats from the last event:

- We served around 55 guests, plus 17 Slate Hill volunteers.
- 16 egg casseroles were donated for the event, although we quickly realized that we didn't prepare enough vegetarian and non-pork options.
- Fruit trays, breakfast pastries and fruit juices rounded out our meal. And COFFEE! We made lots of coffee!

We expect 60-70 men and women to attend this year and, once again, we will need lots of help! Look for the sign-up sheets on the bulletin board listing food needs as well as volunteers for preparing, serving and interacting with our guests, <u>plus</u> clean up afterward. 
# Hello From Dallas!

# Greetings from Marty, Glenna and Paul Allen Sollenberger January 2016

Happy New Year! As the Christmas season winds down (Ephiphany/Three Kings Day is January 6), we've been pondering the meaning of the birth, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

# Does it matter which word we use? Bible translation and the meaning of Christmas

As the Mbe\* translation team in Nigeria was translating the Gospel of Luke, they came to chapter 2, verse 7: "She [Mary] gave birth to her first child, a son. She wrapped him snugly in strips of cloth and laid him in a manger, because there was no lodging available for them."



The translators took time to ponder how to translate some of the words, but not "manger." They immediately used the word "ókpáng."

"What's an ókpáng?" asked their consultant, John Watters. "Tell me what it looks like." One of the translators drew a picture. It was essentially a cradle hung by ropes so that the newborn could be laid in it and swung.

"Read the Translator's Notes again," John suggested. "What does it say about the manger?" ("Translator's Notes" is a series of commentaries that are especially helpful for Bible translators for whom English is a second language.)

The Mbe translators read the notes and saw that "manger" referred to an animal feeding trough. Even as the Mbe team read the notes, they objected. "We have always used the word ókpáng, and that's what we should use."

John pointed out to them that it wasn't just a matter of tradition. God expects us to find the words that express the original meaning as accurately as possible. Furthermore, this word tells us something profound about God. "When He came to live among us and bring salvation to us, He came in the lowliest way possible. He did not come and sleep in a nice ókpáng like every Mbe mother wants for her newborn. Instead, He showed us his unbelievable humility," John told them. "So we need to find your best word for an animal feeding trough."

Suddenly the one who had argued most loudly for the traditional term offered, "We feed our animals out of an old worn-out basket that is not usable anymore except to feed the animals. We call it '£dzábrí."

"Then try that term," said John. "Put it in your rough draft and test it with Mbe speakers."

As the Mbe people listened to the draft with the word 'Édzábrí' for the manger, they were visibly moved. Picturing the newborn Baby lying in the animals' feeding basket, they recognized in a new way that Jesus was willing to do whatever it took to reach them. As an adult, He would humble Himself by washing the disciples' feet and then dying on the cross. And this humility started right from birth, when He was laid in an animal feeding trough.



No word in Scripture is too unimportant to translate carefully and accurately. And no language community is too unimportant to merit the Scriptures in the language they best understand. John says, "Translation in the heart language respects the people who speak it, and through the process it frees them to have a relationship with God in their own words and terms."

\*Mbe is a translation project facilitated by The Seed Company and is a partnership with the Ogoja Language Commission, church denominations in the area, The JESUS Film Project, Lutheran Bible Translators, the Great Commission Movement, and the Luke Partnership.
