Mennonite World Conference Updates

Stats: We currently have over 785 requests for homestays. The majority of these requests are coming from Zimbabwe and India, and we're seeing a rise in requests from the United States and Canada as well. We have placed people from 51 different countries into 242 households and have approximately 85 households with space remaining. As we are seeing the number of requests for homestays increase, we will surely use most of the remaining households, and we are planning to give everyone the final guest information in early July. We are still in need of approximately 270 more beds, so please continue to recruit others in your church to consider hosting.

Shuttle Buses: We are working on the locations of the shuttle buses and will have this information finalized much closer to July. At that time there will be more specific information regarding a shuttle bus number, location and specific time of pick-up and drop-off. Depending upon distance from the Farm Show Complex, the morning pick-ups will be generally between 8:00 and 8:30am and the evening drop-offs will be generally between 9:15 and 9:45pm.

Monday Lodging: We are see the majority of the homestay registrants will be arriving on Monday, July 20. (The Assembly begins on Tuesday, July 21 in the afternoon).

Celebration of Church Life: The Lancaster Mennonite Conference's Annual Celebration of Church Life event this year focuses on "hospitality", specifically around hosting the MWC Assembly. The date is March 21 and the location is Mount Joy Mennonite Church. Everyone is encouraged to attend, however we want to note that this is being organized by the Lancaster Mennonite Conference, not from MWC or our committee. We hope to see many of you there!!

Hittin' the Books!

As many of you know, I am currently working toward a Master's in Counseling on the Marriage, Couple, and Family Counseling (MCFC) Track at Messiah College. The church board has chosen to provide funding towards my graduate credits. Since YOU are part of that equation, I use Hilltop articles like this to keep you informed of my progress.

I am now most of the way through my early spring semester class, Crisis, Trauma, and Grief Counseling. This course is not a requirement for the MCFC counseling track, but I chose to add it because of its relevance to pastoral work.

Crisis is a response to an event that feels out of control and beyond our ability to cope. Different events can trigger crisis for different people. This course has looked at a variety of situations including intimate partner violence, sexual assault and rape, child abuse, homicide, suicide, substance abuse, psychiatric crises, and major disasters. Other events that can activate a crisis response include major illness, infertility, job loss, divorce, infidelity, family conflict, spiritual questioning, and more. General approaches to crisis intervention as well as specifics pertaining to various situations were studied. The process of grief and ways to assist people who are grieving was also a major topic for the course.

This is so true. Bob and I struggled with so many things when our 14-year-old daughter, Jenny Saline, became a paraplegic during her fight with cancer. The challenges were often simple tasks like getting the wheelchair close enough to the sink when she brushed her teeth.

We faced different challenges when Bob's 95-year old father could no longer walk independently. Getting to the dentist, the barber—all these things became a big deal. Marlis's story below resonated with us.

Recently, Charlie desperately needed a trim. We live in a senior living community and there is a beauty shop on campus that also caters to gentlemen. To get there, I must put Charlie in the car and drive him around the corner to the building that houses the shop. Then, he must walk into the building and down a very long corridor to get to the shop. This has become extremely difficult for him since the mobility in his legs has all but left him.

My answer to the problem was to go into the back of the closet and dig out a hair trimming set that my gadget guru husband had purchased several years ago. It had never been used; but was hidden away, waiting for just such a day. beloved discussions and fellowship time. All in all, the group was a wonderful experience, and may be enjoyed by ANY couple at ANY level of marriage: new marriages, old marriages, good marriages, bad marriages, it doesn't matter. Anyone looking to strengthen their marriage by the Grace of God will benefit from Marriage Enhancement Group. I know we did!

When the time came for the big weekend retreat to Camp Hebron, needless to say, we were ready! We arrived at Camp Hebron on a chilly Friday evening in November, and we all warmed up with the coffee, tea, and snacks. We all watched the movie "Fireproof" together, a movie in which a modern-day couple is caught in the horrific throes of a dysfunctional marriage and in which the way of God is chosen, and ultimately prevails. Saturday morning found my spouse and me waking at dawn for a GORGEOUS hike along Peter's Mountain. How romantic it was, being alone in such a beautiful place and discussing all the wonderful information and topics we were learning. In addition to our Marriage Enhancement Notebooks, we were given numerous handouts and articles, all of them quite useful to strengthening a marriage. My spouse and I left feeling invigorated and energized in our marriage, as well as feeling relaxed and at peace with God after such a wonderful weekend immersed in His Holy Word.

Subsequent to the retreat, the couples in the group met again to finish some of the topics in our notebook, as well as our

Charlie had to stop and rest twice on the walk down the long corridor and was nearly in a state of collapse by the time he got there. But he got through the wash, cut and eyebrow trim, and even managed to flirt a bit with the girls.

By the time he was done I had searched the building until I found a wheelchair I could borrow to wheel him back to the car. Whew!

Now the question becomes; how do we handle the next haircut. I am on the search for a traveling beautician who will come to the house and pamper him with none of the stress to which he has become accustomed.

I am afraid we are rapidly reaching the point where he will no longer be able to leave the house for anything, including doctor's appointments. I don't look forward to that day because there will only be one answer to that problem; a nursing home. And that is a solution that his daughter, who lives five hours away, does not want to hear; that's another dilemma.

Marriage Enrichment Group

NOTE Confidentiality is paramount in the Marriage Enhancement Group. For that reason, the identities of the participating couples will be kept discreet, as well as the identity of this author.

A few months ago, you may have noticed a small ad in our weekly bulletin telling us about a "Marriage Enhancement Group" (MEG) being formed right here at Slate Hill. The group being formed was seeking four married couples who were looking to strengthen their marriages "by focusing on the spiritual components of this God-ordained relationship" (verbatim from our M.E.G. workbook.) The group was formed and led by Associate Pastor Joy Fasick, who is currently pursuing her Master's Degree in Counseling at Messiah College in Marriages.

We contacted Joy and inquired about the group. She explained how the format of the group would work and gave us some idea of what to expect, and listened to what we hoped to get out of the experience. When the "massemail" went out about the group that my spouse and I were delighted to learn that the other couples in the group were all Slate Hillers that we had become quite close with over the past few years.
