New Medical School in Ghana

I recently spent three weeks (which is way too long to be away from Jen, Micah and El-lie!!!) in Ghana with seven medical students from Penn State College of Medicine. During our trip we were able to connect up with Esther Kumi (in center of photo, wearing yellow and blue dress)! Many of you will recall that Esther stayed with our family for a year and came to church with us for her senior year of high school, 2014-15. She graduated from the school that our kids attend, Lancaster Mennonite School, Hershey Campus. Everyone who met Esther knows what a bright and fun person she is!

Esther helped our team in Ghana a great deal by serving as a translator for the medical students as they conducted household interviews related to issues of malnutrition. The medical students were impressed at how quickly she caught on and picked up the material. They all really enjoyed spending time with her!

Esther is currently waiting to enter college. She anticipates joining Mount Crest University, a private university in Ghana, which will be opening up a new medical school in Ghana next year. This is the institution I have been collaborating with, and my trips to Ghana have largely been to forge a mentoring relationship between the Penn State College of Medicine and Mount Crest University as they build their medical school. I'm particularly enthused about this venture because the medical school will be the first rural medical school in Ghana, situated within the community and closely connected to it.

The medical students' projects in Ghana is based on some of the work I did in Haiti with Vitamin A supplementation. The students explored issues related to Vitamin A deficiency, iodine deficiency, and iron deficiency anemia. We want to pilot a couple of projects in one of the Regions (or States) based on some of what I tried in Haiti, and hopefully we can help the Eastern State to reach every kid in every village with some of these health interventions. It is often the hardest-to-reach kids who are both the most neglected and, sadly, the most in need of these interventions. We're hoping to help them reach those kids!

Slate Hiller Goes to Prison

Amanda "Mandy" Rempel could have worked between her sophomore and junior years this summer, but she thought it was more important to be a witness for Christ. Mandy looked for an opportunity to combine her love for Christ and dancing during the summer. She learned about Shining Light Ministries, which is based in Annville, PA and decided to spend the summer witnessing in prison as part of their team. Shin-

ing Light Ministries recruits Christian, college-aged actors, dancers, singers and musicians from across the country each year to offer twelve *Impact* events in correctional facilities throughout the US. By using performing arts, the cast of Christian performers breathes the Gospel of hope into the hearts of those plagued with criminal backgrounds. Stereotypes and walls between "us" and "them" are shattered through the interaction of the students and inmates.

You've probably seen Mandy at Slate Hill as she worships here while attending Messiah College. She faithfully serves with the Slate Hill group in partnership with Cumberland Vista. She is working on a double major in Nutrition & Dietetics and Dance. Mandy decided to sign up to be a dancer for Shining Light's 2016 Summer Ministry Tour. She had to raise \$1,300 in support to cover the cost of participating in the summer ministry. Slate Hill contributed \$200 from the Chicken BBQ proceeds to assist Mandy with the support she needed; other individuals from Slate Hill more than doubled that contribution!

One of the twelve correctional facilities Shining Light visited, from Philadelphia to Maine, was the State Correctional Institution in Chester, PA. Slate Hiller, Ulli Klemm, who works for the PA Dept. of Corrections was invited by the director of Shining Light to attend a performance and he made it a priority to be in attendance. "The inmates clearly enjoyed, and were impacted by, the performance. Inmates stood afterwards to say they felt the performers were speaking directly to their life situations," commented Ulli. "The institution really welcomed Shining Light with open arms, and that made this outreach possible." Mandy was impacted as well by her participation. "I think the inmates were the most enthusiastic audience I have ever performed for! It was amazing to shake hands with a population that I used to be afraid of and to use the gift of dance God gave me to bring joy to these people."

Mandy further developed her dancing skills while performing with Shining Light yet infused it with her deep faith. Mandy extends her thanks and great appreciation. - "Thanks so much for the support from Slate Hill. It's so encouraging to see this response from the Slate Hill community when I have only been a part of it for a short time!"

Directions to Cumberland Vista from Rt. 15 and Lisburn Road

Head west on Lisburn Road 1.3 miles. At traffic light at Williams Grove Road make a LEFT (heading south) for 2.1 miles. At stop sign at 74 North (Carlisle Road/York Road) make a RIGHT. Go 0.5 miles. Slow down as you approach The Meeting House (formerly called Cumberland Valley Brethren In Christ Church) which will be on your left. Make a LEFT into the church parking lot and keep going straight up the driveway on the hill. It will bear to the right then curve to the left at the top of the hill where you can either park in front of, or behind, the Cumberland Vista home. Meetings and events usually begin in the basement. For special events (cooking/baking, etc.) we usually converge on the first floor which is the top entrance.

Hello from Dallas!

Greetings from Marty, Glenna and Paul Allen Sollenberger **July 2016**

Making a difference - in Dallas?


Dallas is home to groups of refugees, including Karen and Karenni people of Myanmar/Burma. Many of the adults never learned to read and write; some don't even know how to hold a book and turn the pages! Studies have shown that people learn best in their own language. So an ESL program (Teaching English as

a Second Language) asked GIAL* for help. After some discussion, literacy professor Steve Walters and his brave students took it on as a class project. In 3 months they developed a new Roman alphabet (these languages are written in Burmese script), an alphabet chart and primers to help people learn to read in the new alphabet. Though 3 months wasn't long enough to test and perfect the new alphabet, the project made a difference for many of the Karen and Karenni refugees. A refugee who is deaf learned to write a word in her language, then immediately connected it with the sound of the English word "meet", Another ESL student always skipped class whenever they had a spelling test. She took the primer home and got someone to go through it with her. The next time they had an English spelling test, she took it and passed. It was exciting for these GIAL literacy students to apply the skills they were learning to a real-life situation and see the difference it made.



Exodus Story, Camp Hebron Style

"The script never goes quite as planned," noted Ulli Klemm, camp pastor at the 2016 Shalom Camp for those with special needs at Camp Hebron. When a doll pretending to be baby Moses was pulled from a river by special needs camper, Karen (portraying the Pharaoh's daugher), Karen clutched the doll lovingly in her arms. When Ulli asked her what the baby's name was, Karen blurted out loud: "SUSIE!"

"That is par for the course with any and every skit with those with special needs," Ulli added. "There is ALWAYS an element of surprise."

This is the fourth year that Ulli has donated a week of his vacation to volunteer as camp pastor for Shalom Camp. Slate Hiller Linda Mininger has served in this role in the past as well. Camp pastors are in charge of leading eight (8) worship sessions at the five-day camp and being present during other activities to encourage the campers. This year, in addition to being in charge of the worship time, he also led the singing.

The theme of 2016 summer camps at Camp Hebron was "Freedom is Coming." With Pastor Lynn having just preached a series of sermons on the life of Moses, Ulli decided to focus his worship sessions on the promise of God's freedom to the Israelites while in bondage as slaves in Egypt. Writing a skit for each of the eight worship sessions at Shalom Camp, the special needs campers took turns as actors bringing the story of the Exodus to new life.

Just as Moses was renamed "Susie" in one of the skits, several other deviations from the printed scripts took place. While special needs camper, Neal, who played the role of adult Moses for the week, took pleasure in bopping an Egyptian soldier over the head with half of a Styrofoam swim-



ming pool noodle, he didn't like knowing Pharaoh wanted him "dead or alive" for this capital offense. So, naturally, Neal voiced that he did NOT want to return to Egypt after hearing from God in the burning bush. Only after Ulli sweetened the deal and told Moses he could take his brother, Aaron, with him did Moses agree to return to Egypt.

Special needs camper, Dan, who portrayed Pharaoh, also took his role to heart. In contrast to the Biblical account where ten plagues wreaked havoc upon Pharaoh and the Egyptians before Pharaoh decided to let the Israelites go, Dan didn't want to be "the bad guy." After just four plagues, Dan took the microphone in hand and said: "Everybody: I'm a good guy. I love God. Let the people go." Ulli had to convince Dan to hold off on his generosity at least until the next session; then he could be the good guy.

"There are always surprises when one works with those with special needs," said Ulli. That's what makes walking alongside these special individuals so much fun. The story included the campers eating real matzah in the desert and concluded with a modified celebration of the Passover, with matzah serving as the body of Christ which makes us FREE from sin.
