



HERE COMES THE SUN: SOLAR POWER BRINGS WATER AND ELECTRICITY TO SHIRATI HOSPITAL

For years, leaking pipes and an erratic power grid stood in the way of a steady water supply for Shirati Hospital in Tanzania. Located a little more than one mile from Lake Victoria, the largest lake in Africa, the hospital often operated without running water for several weeks at a time.

Now a seamless, 4-inch plastic pipe—running 1.7 miles between the lake and the hospital—and a new solar-powered water pump mean a reliable source of water for the 160-bed hospital, which is a ministry of the Tanzania Mennonite Church. The hospital was started by Mennonite missionaries in 1935. Dale Ressler, volunteer executive director of Friends of Shirati, at-

tends Slate Hill, and Slate Hill has supported Friends of Shirati in a variety of ways, including a Christmas giving project that raised money toward playground equipment outside of the new pediatric ward at the hospital.

Within the first three weeks of operation, the solar-powered system had pumped more than 500,000 gallons of water from Lake Victoria to Shirati Hospital. Hospital staff noted that without water shortages, surgical procedures and daily tasks of patient care are much easier. Dr. Bwire Chirangi, medical director of the hospital, says that operating a hospital without consistent running water was an extreme challenge. Many days even the operating rooms had no running water. "One of the permanent agenda items during my leadership has been addressing the unreliable water supply to the hospital," Chirangi says. "Now I can perform all my surgeries with confidence, knowing that water will be there. Our daily work in the hospital has been changed and made much more efficient by having reliable, affordable water. It has also given us opportunities to serve the neighborhood."

In addition to providing water to the hospital, the new solar-powered pump will be connected to four

stations around the hospital, to which people in the community will have access. Many people in the Shirati area have had to walk several miles round-trip each day for water.

"Waking up the morning after the solar water project was completed and seeing a video of people collecting water was a dream come true," says Ressler. "You simply can't do medical work without water. After visiting Shirati Hospital in May, when they had *no* running water for three weeks, I experienced this as a gift from God."

The water project is one of two solar power projects Shirati Hospital. A solar electricity project will use 88 solar panels and more than 400 batteries to generate enough power to run the Shirati Hospital and the Shirati College of Health Sciences, as well as a residence for people living with leprosy. Solar electricity will grant these organizations energy independence, releasing them from expensive electricity bills and fluctuating electrical surges from the government supplier. The solar electricity project is expected to be operational before the end of 2016.

For the solar electricity project, Friends of Shirati purchased the solar panels and set up a lease purchase agreement with the hospital, in which the hospital's monthly payments to Friends of Shirati go toward the eventual purchase of the system and to replenish the revolving loan fund. Friends of Shirati will charge

the hospital about 60 percent of the amount of the hospital's previous monthly electricity bill. Additional donations offset the final amount for which the hospital will be responsible.

As in many parts of the Majority World, Tanzania's renewable energy sector has expanded greatly in recent years. For church-related organizations such as Shirati Hospital, generating electricity and running water from the sun makes sense from economic, environmental, and theological perspectives. "The pump uses God's abundant sunshine, an almost unused resource, to pump his other abundant resource—water—which is the most urgent need of the people," says Friends of Shirati board member Glen Brubaker, who is currently living in Shirati to help with the project. "And it completely avoids poisoning the environment with diesel, oil, and carbon dioxide."

Friends of Shirati, which was organized as a committee under Eastern Mennonite Missions, Salunga, Pa., to support the work of Shirati Hospital, became a nonprofit organization in 2005. The hospital was started by Mennonite missionaries in 1935. In addition to estate gifts and individual donations, churches, Sunday School classes, and small groups have provided funds to Friends of Shirati for a variety of projects. Friends of Shirati provides grants to Shirati Hospital for medicine and medical supplies, pays hospital bills for children whose families can't afford to pay, and supports community education efforts that raise awareness about HIV and AIDS. Other recent projects include removal of asbestos roofing and expansion of the pediatric ward, as well purchase of diagnostic equipment such as a new autoclave, infusion unit, and x-ray machine. "We always work on projects that the hospital administration prioritizes," says Ressler. "They decide what projects they want to do, and then we support that."







Hittin' the Books!

As many of you know, I am currently working toward a Master's in Counseling on the Marriage, Couple, and Family Counseling (MCFC) Track at Messiah College. The church board has chosen to provide funding towards my graduate credits. Since YOU are part of that equation, I use Hilltop articles like this to keep you informed of my progress.

Early December finds me continuing my late fall class, Psychopathology and Diagnosis. As I mentioned in the November article, this course involves writing DSM-5 (Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders) diagnoses and treatment plans for fictional "clients" each week. As counselors, we diagnose mental health disorders of all sorts – anything from intellectual disabilities to schizophrenia to narcolepsy to anorexia and beyond. Counselors also consider other areas that may be the focus of clinical attention. The DSM-5 specifies codes for these areas as well, ranging from various types of relationship distress to occupational problems to problems related to poverty and more. Treatment planning combines both the primary diagnosis and these other areas to work towards improved wellness in a whole-health sense.

As has been the case for nearly all of my classes, my project this semester again relates directly to my work at Slate Hill. Through the project, I'm researching specific approaches for treating a need that I've encountered here at church. I'm thankful that this program has allowed me to directly apply the learning to my work and vice versa.

Directions to Cumberland Vista from Rt. 15 and Lisburn Road

Head west on Lisburn Road 1.3 miles. At traffic light at Williams Grove Road make a LEFT (heading south) for 2.1 miles. At stop sign at 74 North (Carlisle Road/York Road) make a RIGHT. Go 0.5 miles. Slow down as you approach The Meeting House (formerly called Cumberland Valley Brethren In Christ Church) which will be on your left. Make a LEFT into the church parking lot and keep going straight up the driveway on the hill. It will bear to the right then curve to the left at the top of the hill where you can either park in front of, or behind, the Cumberland Vista home. Meetings and events usually begin in the basement. For special events (cooking/baking, etc.) we usually converge on the first floor which is the top entrance.
