

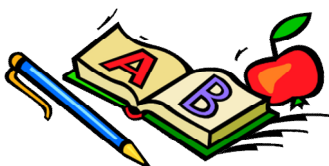

Hittin' the Books!



As many of you know, I am currently working toward a Master's in Counseling on the Marriage, Couple, and Family Counseling (MCFC) Track at Messiah College. The church board has chosen to provide funding towards my graduate credits. Since YOU are part of that equation, I use Hilltop articles like this to keep you informed of my progress.

One major change this semester is that I'm actually on campus! With the exception of two one-week intensive classes, all of my coursework has been online. Now I'm a campus regular as this year I'm completing two semesters of internships at Messiah College's Engle Center. I'll be counseling full-time undergraduate students there on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays.

In many ways, this field experience is quite different from my practicum at Daybreak last spring. Obviously, the client demographics are different at Messiah; I have a lot to learn about young adults! Another difference is that I'm one of three interns at the Engle Center and our supervisor provides structured educational experiences to compliment both our current counseling and our long-term education, an asset not available at many sites. Messiah also uses an online medical records system, so I'm adjusting to that program. Both Daybreak and the Engle Center had advantages and I'm grateful to have had such different placements.

My 21 hours/week at the Engle Center will include onsite supervision. The internship class also includes an average of about two hours per week of either group or individual supervision, in addition to traditional coursework such as reading, exams, and projects. For this semester, I'll also have an hour each week of outside supervision with an LMFT (Licensed Marriage and Family Therapist) specific to the systemic perspectives central to marriage and family therapists. With all of that supervision, I anticipate a semester of rich growth!

One final note about this semester is that I'm scheduled to take National Counselor Exam, or NCE, on Saturday, October 21. As is the case for anyone taking a comprehensive certification test, this is a high-pressure time. I'd appreciate your prayers as I prepare for, participate in, and then wait for results of this exam.

Finally, I'll add a reminder here that I will be on sabbatical from my pastoral work during October, November, and December of this year. My intention is to use this sabbatical as both an education and a renewal time, keeping up with the tasks described above, but also having more opportunities to spend time in quiet with God and connect to His creation and taking advantage of the opportunity to visit other churches. It will be strange not being a regular part of Slate Hill life! Yet, I look forward to this time to disconnect, reflect, and find renewal. I'll see you on Christmas Eve and then be back in January. Meanwhile, please direct any needs to Lynn or one of the elders.

Major contributions included college scholarships as well as donations by individuals who volunteered to help with my educational costs. A few years ago, the Ladies' Fellowship group read the book "7" by Jan Hatmaker. In the introduction, the author writes, with a touch of sarcasm, of the church she and her pastor husband had previously led, "Fortunately, we didn't have to worry about the poor because we were paid pros, serving the saved. We spent so much time blessing blessed people, there was nothing left over." That line made an impression on me precisely because it is a large part of the reason I first came to Slate Hill Mennonite Church. I didn't want to be a part of the crowd blessing the blessed, and Slate Hill seems to agree with that sentiment.

The goals for Hilltop FunFest are (and I hope you already know this) to build relationships, practice hospitality and have fun living our faith. In essence, we are blessing anyone who climbs the hill to the church property. There is no way to completely accurately count the number of attendees, but anyone who was there saw that a lot of people were blessed on June 3! And it wasn't just our guests who were blessed, as anyone who has served in any capacity learns: blessing someone else always winds up blessing both of you!

And of what value is all of that blessing?
