# ewing Comfort and Love



Have you ever wondered what the women's sewing group does with the funds they raise from their bake sales? Since the beginning of the year, we have donated 22 adult sized comforters to Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) and 33 baby sized comforters to local Christian pregnancy centers. Gene and I have the privilege of dropping off the baby comforters and hearing the appreciation from the volunteers of how much their young women appreciate a warm, soft comforter for their newborn.

The funds we receive are used to purchase fabric and other supplies to make comforters and school kit bags. Each comforter has three layers, the top layer is pieced from brightly colored squares of fabric, the middle layer contains batting which provides warmth, and the bottom layer is usually a single piece of fabric and is referred to as the backing. These three layers are knotted (tied) together with thread and then a binding is sewn around the edge to finish the comforter. We hope to display the comforters periodically and have a prayer of blessing upon them prior to shipping them to the Material Resource Center for global distribution.

Thank you for your generosity during our bake sales and for donations through the offering envelope system which allows us to continue this ministry. While we cannot thank each of you personally, we are grateful for each and every donation. We try to be good stewards of the funds we receive by purchasing items on sale, using coupons, and by using non-traditional "fabric sources" such as gently used cotton or flannel sheets, pillowcases, or clothing which can be repurposed into fabric squares or backing.

As you can see, many steps are involved in creating one comforter and many hands are involved in the process from start to finish - cutting squares, sewing the squares together, ironing seams, and knotting the layers together. Not only do we enjoy making the comforters and school kit bags, but we also enjoy the fellowship of one another! We are changing our sewing night to the second Wednesday evening of the month following the WNO meal. Ladies, you are invited to join us on the designated night or stop in to see what we are all about.

### GOOD THINGS COME TO THOSE WHO WAIT IN LINE

It's been three years since the residents of Cumberland Vista attended a Hershey Bears ice hockey game. Previously, a generous (non-Slate Hill) donor provided tickets to enable all residents, along with a volunteer buddy, to attend games between 2012-2014. However tickets could not be secured for the past two years since the donor no longer had a connection to the Bears. But, after

the fiftieth time or so of Margie (a resident at Cumberland Vista) asking Ulli Klemm when they would go to a Bears' game again, he took the initiative to see if the tickets could be secured via a different route.

Earlier this fall, Ulli asked Jim Roberts, the director of C.R.O.S.S. (the parent organization of Cumberland Vista), to contact the Bears seeking consideration for ticket donations. No response has been received yet. Meanwhile, a coworker of Ulli's informed him of a limited time special-deal the Bears were offering. For each ticket purchased before midnight on October 9th, a second ticket would cost only 80 cents! However, each customer could only purchase a total of four tickets. Ulli and Theda arranged to pick up three residents from Cumberland Vista (Theresa, Lonie and Chris) to make the trip to purchase 20 tickets before the offer expired. When Theresa stepped to the box office counter, she repeated the phrase Ulli prompted her to say to the teller, "We want to make a deal!". Then Ulli explained that the group needed 20 tickets close to each other. One by one each resident and Ulli purchased the allotted four tickets.

Before Theda could purchase the last four tickets, a customer at a neighboring ticket window called to us. "Excuse me. What game is your group going to see? I have four free tickets." Towering over us with a gentle disposition and a smile, John P. had been observing the Cumberland Vista residents patiently waiting in line to buy their tickets. Ulli replied they were buying tickets for the November 12<sup>th</sup> game. John said, "I want you to have my four free tickets. My sister lived in a group home and it would be my pleasure to give these to you." We were overwhelmed with gratitude and thanked John with warm handshakes, somewhat surprised by the grace that had just been visited upon us.

"Sometimes God uses others to bless His children," Ulli told Theresa, Lonie and Chris as they headed back to the car. "That was very nice of that man," said Theresa. "Indeed it was," said Ulli in reply. "We're going to a Bears game!" exclaimed Chris as we headed out of the box office doors.

Indeed, good things come to those who wait in line and because of generous persons like John P.



What would you do if your people didn't have God's Word in their language? "Our people have been longing for the Word of God in our language" Rev. Bennett Marona

"Some pastors, though they read English, they cannot ieven nterpret what exactly does this passage mean to their congregation," Pho'dunze Martin Eliya, Translator Baka New Testament.

"I want to make my community to know God. I want them to hear God's voice with their own ears. Bringing the word of God to my people is more important to me than all other things." Rev. Bennett Marona.

Rev. Bennett Marona has worked faithfully for years to translate the New Testament into Baka. When civil war broke out in southern Sudan (now South Sudan), he and his family had to flee to refugee camps in Zaire (now Democratic Republic of the Congo).

Rev. Bennett continued the translation work in the refugee camp, along with a multinational team of translation and literacy consultants. Finally after seven years, Rev. Bennett and his family prepared to return to South Sudan, but violence broke out in Congo, and Rev. Bennett was arrested. Amazingly, the soldiers who were going to kill him had a change of heart. Instead of killing him, they traveled with him to South Sudan to keep him safe on the way!

Thanks to the dedication of Rev. Bennett Maroni, the Baka New Testament is one of the 23 newly-translated Scriptures at Wycliffe's 75th Anniversary and Scripture Celebration at Wycliffe's U.S. headquarters on Friday, September 29, 2017.

This month (October) Wycliffe is hosting a Bible Translation Conference in Dallas, TX. Over 500 Bible translators from around the world will be meeting together, including national translators like Rev. Bennett Marona. It is a real joy to serve these visitors through computer/technical support and library services. May God use this conference to speed the work of Bible translation so that people like the Baka can say, in the words of Rev. Bennett, "God is not a foreigner anymore. Jesus is one of us. He can talk direct."
