

Ways you can help are listed below.

Friday, April 20, 6:00-7:30/8:00PM

- Wrap potatoes in foil, tally, and pack ovens.
- Place cookies in zip lock bags.
- Place applesauce on trays.
- Set up picnic area, place directional, exit and thank you signs.
- Place tables and coolers in church lobby.

Saturday, April 21 (various times)

- GRILL CHICKEN (8 volunteers needed) starting at 6:00AM.
- ◆ BAKE POTATOES (2 volunteers needed) one at 8:00AM, second one at 10:00AM.
- FLAG PERSON (1 volunteer needed) to direct traffic.
- GREETER (1 volunteer needed) Welcome customers; give out numbers and information sheets.
- RUNNERS (3 volunteers needed) Take orders, receive payment, give change
- MANAGER (4 volunteers needed) Receive order from designated Runner, follow order through assembly line, and deliver to customer with a smile and a thank you.
- CHICKEN PACKERS (3 volunteers needed) One to bag the chicken, two others record temperatures & close chicken bags.
- ASSEMBLY LINE WORKERS (12-16 volunteers needed) Package potatoes, rolls & butter, applesauce, cookies, utensils, wipes, and beverages; place dinners in bags.
- BANKER (1 volunteer needed) Supplies runners with change and greeter with numbers.
- POWER WASH GRILLS (2 volunteers needed)
- CLEAN UP (8 volunteers needed) Start at noon. Take down all signs and tables; wash and sanitize chicken boxes; clean and dry all coolers; put leftover supplies away; dump trash in dumpsters.

We had a sign-up sheet for food contributions, but there were a number of lines unfilled. So Ray and Fran and Ken and I put our shoulders to the wheel. We planned and shopped and cooked our hearts out - producing five loaves and two small fish.

But Sunday morning the food began to come - first a trickle and then a tsunami. There was so much food we hardly knew where to put it. And when it was over, and everyone had eaten their fill, we collected 12 baskets full left over.

Hittin' the Books!

As many of you know, I am currently working toward a master's degree in counseling on the Marriage, Couple, and Family Counseling (MCFC) Track at Messiah College. The church board has chosen to provide funding towards my graduate credits. Since YOU are part of that equation, I use Hilltop articles like this to keep you informed of my progress. I confess that it has been a while since my last article. Despite being back from sabbatical for a few months now, time has flown by so quickly that I've not written any new updates. Here is an attempt at catching up!



This semester I'm continuing my internship placement at Messiah College's Engle Center for Counseling and Health Services. The facility is a full-service health center with nurses and a certified nurse practitioner, offering everything from sick and injury care to medication management, diagnostic services, physicals, immunizations, and allergy shots. We also have a registered dietitian who works with students learning to accommodate food allergies while eating on campus, seeking help for disordered eating, or trying to set and achieve nutrition goals. A true blessing of counseling at Engle has been the close connection between counselors and medical staff. I see daily the benefit that comes from collaborative care.

The counseling side of the building includes six full-time, one part-time, and three intern counselors. As you may have heard, the need for mental health services is rising rapidly in the United States and colleges and universities are on the front lines of this surge. Engle is a busy place! As an intern counselor, it has been wonderful to work in such a supportive environment, learning from professionals who specialize in drug and alcohol counseling, treating eating disorders, sexual addictions, cultural challenges, and more.

I work at Engle on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays, logging an average of 20-24 hours per week. Most of my time there is spent counseling individual students. In addition, since last fall another intern and I have partnered together to create and run an Anxiety Management Group, a five-week skill-building group that loops continuously to provide a ready resource to students experiencing anxiety. We shared a few of the techniques from this group with employees at the March Employee Wellness Work-shop and are working with others on campus to create ways to make this group even more widely available next year. Recently, I've joined with another intern to begin a new group for students who experience social anxiety. This is an eight-week closed group (all students join at the same time; the group membership "closes" after the first session) based on a project I wrote for my internship class. A group for people who don't like being in groups is a bit of a risk, but it has been well-received and the members are already citing benefits from the learning and sharing that occurs in this context.

The design of the group for students with social anxiety was but one of many projects in my internship class. There was a bit of "syllabus shock" for me last December when I realized that this final semester included even more projects and papers than the previous one! While I continue to be thankful for all I am learning, the journey has been quite long enough. I look forward to May 12, when I will work only one job and no longer live under the burden of textbooks, papers, and course assignments. The opportunity to spend more time with my family - who has been abundantly patient but is also feeling quite "done" - will certainly be welcome!!

I'm also looking forward to transitioning to full-time work here at Slate Hill. My time at the Engle Center has been fruitful and educational and my learning there will enhance my work here. But I treasure the variety that comes with pastoral work! It will be a joy to be able to engage in it more fully - with fewer outside demands and greater flexibility.

Thank you for your support during this busy season. Please continue to pray for my family as we navigate the home stretch!



Neighbors with Special Needs Embraced at 2018 Spring Fling

Within three days of the announcement being sent to former Spring Fling participants telling them they could register for the March 3, 2018 Spring Fling, slots were filled! By days' end, wonderful memories were carved in the hearts of the 60 adults with special needs and 30 care takers who attended the event.

The Spring Fling, which has taken place in one form or another since 2009, has become one of the highlights of the year for neighbors with

special needs. Travelling from as far as Shippensburg, Elliottsburg, Chambersburg, Hanover and Carlisle and points in between, families, group homes and individuals with special needs converged on our hill for a day of fun, food and fellowship.



Participants were embraced as friends by 44

Slate Hill volunteers who gave of their time and love. An additional 20 volunteers were recruited by Ulli Klemm through his place of work and the gym he frequents. Volunteers helped guests with carnival games; painted the coolest designs on faces and arms; served lunch; tracked folks down for shoulder massages; pushed wheelchairs; played live music; decorated tables; and took tons of pictures. Pictures were sent to guests and volunteers after the event.

One family commented: "Matthew, Sardia and Jadzia had such a great time at the Spring Fling. Thank you so much. It was so well organized with so many fun things to do. Thank you also for the pictures that will be great reminders of that fun day. Special thanks to Dale Weaver for being such a helpful guide since it was our first time there. All your volunteers did a great

Stewardship University 2018

Six Slate Hillers enjoyed an inspiring day at Stewardship University on Saturday, March 3. All had our understandings of "stewardship" expanded as we delved into issues of poverty, racism, substance abuse, planned giving, long-term health care and many others. For those who like to plan ahead...the date for 2019 is Saturday, March 2.

Several personal reflections:

Ruth Ritchie:

Upon hearing about Stewardship University, I was intrigued mainly because I wanted to see how this was discussed outside a sermon environment and in a "conference" and professional environ-

ment, and the name "Stewardship University" sounded serious. Being able to attend sessions directly related to my own life status right now made it feel customized to me. I enjoyed hearing about how one's business/career is a Godly calling in one's life and how to approach that with a ministry mindset, especially in the monotony of everyday business life.

Another point made during one of the sessions I attended was recognizing that stewardship of your finances during times of uncertainty can mean, more often than not, being proactive so that you can make decisions soundly and not out of a reaction to the volatility of the markets or life's circumstances.

Ben Fredrick:

What does wise Christian stewarding for Shalom look like? The sessions I attended really tried to address this:

The opening speaker spoke of "crucible times" which can have a refining effect but can also leave us vulnerable to losing our lives and our souls. He encouraged us to be refreshed by the same Spirit that refreshed Christ, in Sabbath rest.

5 Capitals broadened the notion of capital beyond finances to include Relational, Spiritual, Intellectual, Physical (and time) Capital.

Hidden Rules of Poverty explored the ways we are all guided by 'hidden rules', and that those in poverty grow up learning a certain set of rules that do not apply so well to the Middle Class set of rules. And the Middle Class set of rules don't always line up with the hidden rules the Wealthy live by. This was the most challenging for me. Each of these groups tends to view time, money, food, education, and destiny differently, and that can help us understand one another's behaviors and choices.

Managing Uncertainty. A lawyer and investment CEO spoke to this issue from two different Christian perspectives. Key take-aways: take a deep breath and pause when faced with anxious or uncertain times. Stock market starting to fall? Take a deep breath, pause, wait. Don't be ruled by emotions. Seek out the advice of others and experts--they have often faced similar circumstances and can provide guidance on how to make best decisions.

I am looking forward to attending next year!

I love the way Stewardship University teaches us to embrace stewardship in all of life. It's about so much more than money. This became evident in the three seminars I took. Takeaways from each one touched a variety of places in my current walk with Jesus.


In The Human Side of Addressing Poverty I was most impacted with the reminder that "everyone's journey matters". This has framed numerous conversations and interactions in the weeks since and I suspect will continue to be the reminder I need that our God is way bigger than I often imagine.


Pursuing Radical Stewardship in Everyday Life was presented by parents of two young children who shared the creative and intentional ways they steward their time and resources. My challenge is to find new ways to tend to all God has blessed me with in ways that honor ALL His people and creation.

I attended Preparing for the Cost of Long Term Care with my dad. We learned some new information and were given clarity on more from a panel of folks from three long term care facilities, information that will be helpful in dad's imminent journey and in mine and Ron's future.

If you're looking for new ways to be stretched and challenged, Stewardship University is a good starting point. Join in the day of learning next year!
