


A Prayer Shawl Ministry Provides Comfort, Peace, Caring

Whether they are called Prayer Shawls, Comfort Shawls, Peace Shawls, or Mantles, the Prayer Shawl tradition has returned to Slate Hill following a hiatus. Reinvigorated by Pat White who generously shares yarn from the hat project and thanks to Maxine Zook and others who just like to keep busy, there are now several shawls ready to

thanks to Maxine Zook and others who just like to keep busy, there are now several shawls ready to be shared. The shawls are in the wooden cabinet outside the conference room next to the elevator. If you know of someone who would be comforted by one of these shawls, please feel free to share one.

Prayer shawls symbolize shelter, peace and spiritual sustenance. They also can be called comfort shawls or peace shawls. Many women of different church traditions make and donate hand-knitted and crocheted shawls for those in need. For example, the Church of the Brethren's Prayer Shawl ministry is a simple, universal and enduring message of caring. The creation and presentation of a prayer shawl, like all acts of generosity, enriches the giver as well as the recipient. Compassion and the love of knitting/crocheting is combined into a prayerful way of passing on love and joy. Many blessings are prayed into every shawl—both by the individual making the shawl and by the women's ministry collective, who bless the shawl before it is given to someone. Slate Hill women follow this principal also.

The shawls can be used during prayer or meditation, while undergoing medical procedures, during illness and recovery, while ministering to others, as a comfort after a loss or bereavement, or in times of stress. They can also be used for commitment or marriage ceremonies, birthing or nursing a baby, or as graduation, birthday, anniversary or holiday gifts.

If you are interested in learning how to make a prayer shawl, either by crocheting or on a loom, see Pat White or Maxine Zook. Shawls are made from yarn Pat collects from many sources and donations.






The latest from Marty and Glenna Sollenberger

As we traveled to Pennsylvania, it snowed the day before and the day after on our route, yet we had good weather all the way. And thank you for praying for Marty's health. His sleep issues did not interfere with any of our scheduled activities, another great answer to prayer!

We shared about our Wycliffe ministry at four new churches and connected with two more churches while we were in Pennsylvania. Please pray with us that some of these contacts will become financial partners in our Wycliffe ministry.



We celebrated Easter Sunrise Service at this cemetery next to Marty's home church where some of our friends and family are buried. Slate Hill's Sewing Circle Celebrates 100 years!

(Part 1 of 3 by Ulli Klemm)

This year, the Slate Hill Sewing Circle celebrates its 100th year anniversary. According to Joseph M. Hess, author of *Harvest on the Hill*, the first Mennonite Sewing Circle of Mechanicsburg was organized on June 27, 1918. At the planning meeting it was decided members would meet every two weeks on Thursday afternoons from 1:30 to 4:30 o'clock. It was also decided "each member would pay what they were able to give, but it shall not be less than ten cents a month." Church records indicate the first Sewing Circle meeting convened on July 4, 1918 with twelve workers present. They initially met in a rented room in Mechanicsburg at a cost of \$3 per month.

In its first year of operation, there were 43 members. The group was comprised of women from the congregations of Slate Hill and Churchtown Mennonite. On average, 17 women came to each gathering. "Each session opened with a Scripture reading and prayer and closed with a recitation of the Lord's Prayer," noted Hess.

In the 1940's, Pauline Strong (sister-in-law of Florence Detweiler), organized the Junior Sewing Circle (later called the Willing Workers). The goal for this group of younger sisters was to learn sewing skills. They met in Mrs. Strong's home the first Tuesday of each month.

The Sewing Circle's mission was to help war refugees, orphans in India, and to assist newly opened city missions of the Mennonite Church by sewing garments, quilts and comforters. The ministry created an opportunity for interaction of farming wives from each church and provided a great way to welcome women new to the church. Also, annual Christmas parties sponsored by the Sewing Circle fulfilled an important social need. Due to the Sewing Circle's important missional work, the president of the Sewing Circle served on the church council for many years.

Rosalie Hess Roland's grandmother, Fannie Hess, her mother, Ruth F. Hess and her aunts, Sarah and Anna Zimmerman were all involved in Sewing Circle. "My grandmother always had a quilt she was working on in her living room" remembers Rosalie. "As a young girl, Esther Weaver taught us to knit and crochet," continued Rosalie. "We had sewing machines in the basement for our use. In addition to knotted comforters, Christmas Bundles for little children were a major project and there was always a quilt in a frame ready to be worked on."

Maxine (Hartzler) Zook, who joined the Sewing Circle in the 1940's and served as Secretary for several years recalls making layettes, baby blankets, comforters and quilts. "We put bundles together. Each bundle contained socks, a comb, a bar of soap, a small toy, a shirt and pants (for boys) or a dress (for girls)." These items were wrapped in a towel and brought to Mennonite Central Committee (MCC). During World War II, Maxine, along with Ruth Hertzler and others cut white sheets into strips and rolled them tightly for bandages. They were given to MCC and sent to hospitals in Europe who cared for wounded war casualties. "The Sewing Circle collected offerings to purchase materials as well as to send flowers to those in the church who were sick," remembers Maxine. "Each meeting began with prayer and a devotional. Sewing machines were used to sew patches," recalls Maxine.



In the 1950's, the Sewing Circle met in the newly remodeled church basement. It met the first Tuesday of each month from 7:00-9:00PM. "We took up whole basement - what is now the blue room," commented Julie Quickel, whose mother, Ruth Hertzler provided key leadership to the Sewing Circle. "When my mother came to Slate Hill in the late 1940's," noted Julie, "she became immersed in the Sewing Circle. All I remember was that for my mother, going to Sewing Circle was a given. It was like going to church." At that time, at the end of each two-hour session, the Sewing Circle president facilitated a short business meeting. In addition to reviewing activities and the financial well-being of the group, members took turns offering a musical selection or reading a poem or story which promoted the themes of nature and motherhood. Birthdays were also celebrated. Roughly 30 - 40 persons attended each month.

Esther Rudolf Weaver, from Churchtown Mennonite Church, was part of the Sewing Circle when she and her husband, Chester C. Weaver Sr., attended Slate Hill from 1952-1965. Esther, who recalls serving as the Vice President of this group for a year or two, remembers making comforter tops and sewing shirts. "I was part of the group because it was fun," noted Esther.


